This season includes collaboration between the Youth Symphony of Southern Oregon and Brava! Opera Theater. YSSO and Brava! The Youth Symphony of Southern Oregon congratulates Gabriel Young, Youth Symphony Principal Oboe, and Youth Symphony Concertmaster Esther Aviana Platt on their selection for the 2014 National Youth Orchestra of the United States of America (NYO-USA). Carnegie Hall's Weill Music Institute brings together 120 young musicians from across the country to form the NYO-USA. This year the orchestra will be led by David Robertson, Chief Conductor and Artistic Director of the Sydney Symphony Orchestra. The guest soloist will be violinist Gil Shaham.

The members of NYO-USA will spend two weeks on the campus of Purchase College, SUNY. He has sung the

Mr. Rubio returned to Portland Opera for the west coast premiere of Galileo Galileo by Philip Glass. His New York City operatic debut in Encompass Opera's world premiere production of Angel of the Amazon by Evan Mack garnered critical acclaim. Mr. Rubio performed the title role of Figaro in Il Barbiere di Siviglia in 2011 with the Music Academy of the West. The Los Angeles Times heralded him as a "...Figaro with an impressively booming baritone." While in Santa Barbara, he was selected by legendary mezzo-soprano Marilyn Horne to perform for the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge.

He completed a two-year engagement as a Studio Artist with Portland Opera. His main stage performances with Portland Opera included the roles of Schaunard in *La Bohème*, Sam in *Trouble in Tahiti*, Mercurio in *La Calisto*, Fiorello in *II Barbiere di Siviglia*, Marullo in *Rigoletto*, Barone Douphol in *La Traviata* and Tancredi in *II Combattimento di Tancredi e Clorinda*. Other roles have included Marcello in *La Bohème*, Figaro in *Le Nozze di Figaro*, Dr. Rappaccini in *La Hija de Rappaccini*, Papageno in *The Magic Flute* and Masetto in *Don Giovanni*.

Upcoming engagements include his return to Cincinnati Opera where he will reprise multiple roles in *Galileo Galilei* by Phillip Glass. He will also be heard as Figaro in Tacoma Opera's production of *Il Barbiere di Siviglia*.
